

··· Go back in time

The centre of Lingen has many stories to tell and oozes history from every pore. Between the pretty gables of medieval town houses, the charm of this city steeped in tradition unfolds. It has preserved its customs, such as the "Kivelingsfest", through all the changes that have taken place down the centuries and still celebrates them today.

COSMOPOLITAN AND SELF-CONFIDENT

The cosmopolitan and self-confident image that Lingen presents to visitors today has its roots in the city's eventful history, which begins in the year 975, when the first mention of "Liinga" appears. In the early 14th Century, Lingen receives its town charter. Around the same time, the "Kivelinge" – young, bachelor sons of the bourgeoisie – bravely defend the fortified town while it is under siege – a heroic act that earns them the right to celebrate their "Kivelingsfest" every three years in Lingen

Marketplace in future. Today, thousands of people come to this medieval festival from near and far.

In 1551, the fortified town becomes the property of Emperor Charles V. From now on, the power base in Lingen changes more often than in almost any other German city. Lingen is conquered by the Spaniards, the Dutch, the French and the Prussians, who all leave behind more or less lasting traces which can be seen in the city's buildings, traditions and customs.





GOLDEN AGE The Dutch from Orange are drawn to Lingen by an economic boom, excellent education and the city's characteris tic architecture. The "Golden Age" in the Netherlands extends to the city on the River Ems. As well as the Latin School built in 1680, William III of Orange also founds a university in 1697 which exists until 1820.

THE PRUSSIANS ARRIVE When William III of Orange dies in 1702, Lingen becomes Prussian. The territory is disputed by the French (who take over from 1806 to 1813) and the Kingdom of Hanover (which rules

from 1815 to 1866). From 1867 onwards, with the city once again in Prussian hands, Lingen becomes a county town, and this status does not change until the regional reform in 1977. During the Industrial Revolution, Lingen blossoms economically. The railway repair factory opens in 1856, and the Dortmund-Ems canal in 1899.

THE 20TH CENTURY Here as everywhere, the first half of the 20th Century is shaped by two devastating World Wars and the shadow of National Socialism falls over the city. The Lingen Synagogue is burnt and Jewish fami-

lies are taken away and murdered. Much of the city centre is destroyed by fighting during the final days of the war. Lingen has belonged to the state of Lower Saxony since 1946. The city centre and lively urban districts of Altenlingen, Baccum, Bramsche, Brockhausen, Brögbern, Clusorth-Bramhar, Darme, Holthausen-Biene, Laxten and Schepsdorf together form the "Large Independent City of Lingen (Ems)". With around 55,000 inhabitants, it is now by far the largest city in Emsland, a strong centre of industry and energy, an attractive place to live with lots of green spaces, and the cultural hub of the region.



The city nestles in the beautiful valley of the River Ems. Broad stretches of woodland like the Lingener Wald and the Biener Busch are just minutes away. The outskirts of the city and urban districts are surrounded by fields and meadows — in Lingen you're never far from the countryside!





reason why Lingen was awarded the "Pedestrian- and Cycle-Friendly City" seal. The city centre is particularly well set up for pedestrians and cyclists. So those who want to see the sights by foot or by bike can do this safely — and not just on the moat promenade. By the way — the various city tours around Lingen, e. g. with "Bürgerin Brigitte" or the "Historisches Spektakulum" (historical spectacular) with the "Kivelinge" are a real treat. Welcome to Lingen!

NATURE IN THE RAW... The possibilities for enjoying nature during your leisure time are almost unlimited. Numerous signposted cycle paths lead right into the middle of the

culture-rich landscape of Emsland. Green meadows, yellow cornfields, the soft red of the heather in the Wachendorfer Wacholderhain, all linked by the blue ribbon of the Ems, provide a picturesque backdrop for ramblers, cyclists and horse riders. You can also enjoy the landscape from the water in a canoe.

... AND LOTS MORE BESIDES! For people who like active leisure pursuits, Lingen has even more to offer. The Linus open air swimming pool, for example, or the Klettercamp (Climbing Camp), the 18-hole golf course on the Ems river meadows, numerous sports and fitness facilities etc. etc. etc. ... Lingen is a great place for getting fit!



Lingen is an inspiring and life-enhancing city with an eye to the future. The population is buoyant, because the region has one of the highest birth rates in Germany. This is likely to remain the case until at least 2020. Economic institutions report "above average future potential" for Emsland as a whole. Lingen wants to harness this potential. Lifestyle and work are at the heart of this. Lingen has a lot to offer in both these areas.







INNOVATIVE LIFESTYLES ... Private residential construction has a long and strong tradition in Lingen. The city and its urban districts offer peaceful, child-friendly residential areas with good local amenities. It sets new standards with innovative living concepts for the diverse needs of communities and sole occupants. The Emsauenpark in Reuschberge and the "Wohnen am Wasser" (Living by the Water) project offer new lifestyle options. Future-oriented building materials and techniques based on, for example, low-energy construction play an important role, as do crossgenerational living concepts.

... And a short journey to work!

Many people want to work in the town where they live. For most Lingeners, this is a matter of course. More than 23,400 people in Lingen are currently employees paying social insurance contributions, and most of them work for one of the city's 3,400 or more businesses.

Lingen has a healthy mix of industrial, craft, trade and service companies, industry being the most important sector in this economic hub. The energy industry is particularly strong here. Many people are also employed in the healthcare sector, since Lingen is the region's centre for healthcare.

Lingen scores highly for quality of life, with low unemployment and outstanding, exemplary growth potential for companies. Businesses in Lingen gain inspiration from various "ideas factories" such as the it.emsland information and technology centre, Hochschule Osnabrück (Osnabrück University of Applied Science) and Berufsakademie Emsland (Emsland Vocational Academy). These institutions all ensure a continuous exchange between theory and practice, research and application.


FAMILY-FRIENDLY CITY Lingen gives families with children under 18 a "Family Pass". This card entitles them to numerous reductions on municipal charges and concessions for events. In the summer holidays, around 270 "Holiday Pass" events are organised for families who stay at home, in cooperation with associations and businesses.

IT'S FUN TO GET INVOLVED! Lots of youth clubs and youth centres provide opportunities for leisure and meeting up near home. The "Alter Schlachthof", the city's child, youth and culture centre, has made a name for itself throughout North Germany as an event venue for high-quality youth concerts.

Make your voice heard! Children and young people in Lingen can also get politically active.

The city's Children's and Young People's Parliament is involved in the youth policy decisions of the city council and manages its own budget.

FAMILY AND WORK For many families, reconciling family life with work depends on the available childcare. Lingen offers a closely knit network to help with this. Provision of nursery places for children over three is over 100 percent and crèche facilities are being rapidly expanded. Five family centres support parents in finding the right facility for their child. All Lingen primary schools offer all-day care, with out-of-school care for a fee outside these hours if required.



··→ Take time out

Culture – that vast realm where all facets of life are expressed through music, theatre and art. In Lingen, it really is a realm of riches. Lingen has four theatres and lots of other cultural event and exhibition venues. The cultural scene in Lingen is buzzing!

"ALL THE WORLD'S A STAGE ..." The theatre in the Wilhelmshöhe Culture Park is a classic auditorium with 750 seats presenting operas, plays, musicals, concerts and light comedies. Its audiences number around 55,000 per season, with over 2,500 season tickets per year. Young people can get a taste of the theatre too at particularly low prices with the Youth Cultural Season Ticket.

The theatre in the Lingener Professorenhaus seats up to 140 visitors and presents cabaret and children's theatre productions such as the annual "Kiki und Pupps" children's theatre series. This historic building accommodates the entertaining and exciting "Haus der Sinne" (House of the Senses) over two floors which quests of every age can visit for free during

opening hours. The Professorenhaus is also home to the Theaterpädagogisches Zentrum der Emsländischen Landschaft e.V. (TPZ) (Emsland Drama Education Centre), the largest further training institution of its kind in Germany. Lingen was also the birthplace of a key global event, the World Festival of Children's Theatre, which travels round the world but returns to Lingen every four years. Chamber music, cabaret and sacred music is staged for audiences of up to 400 in the former church building now known as the "Kulturforum St. Michael". The Emslandhallen – the venue for rock, pop, "Schlager" (German popular music) and folk music, which also serves as a meeting place and trade fair exhibition hall – accommodates up to 8,000 people.


The whole city is a stage?

Lingen with the Kunsthalle and Kunstschule (School of Art), both sponsored by the Kunstverein (Art Association). With regular exhibitions by contemporary German and international artists in the Kunsthalle, the art scene really has its finger on the pulse. The Kunstschule inspires young and old alike to explore forms of individual artistic expression, as does the Musikschule (School of Music), the students of which make a name for themselves every year with impressive successes in regional and national competitions.

REGIONAL CULTURE Regional art, culture and history are documented and showcased by a range of institutions. The Emslandmuseum regularly presents much-admired thematic exhibitions and the Lern- und Gedenkort Jüdische Schule (Jewish School Learning and Memorial Centre) runs a permanent exhibition on the fate of Jewish families in Lingen. No less important than the cultural life of Lingen is the role played by the Kivelinge. At the medieval Pfingstfest (Spring Festival) which takes place in Lingen every three years, the bachelor sons of the bourgeoisie celebrate the "Historisches Spektakulum" just like they first did over 600 years ago. They were awarded this right for their courage in defending Lingen, and today the festival is a gift from the "Kivelinge" to the citizens and the many visitors who come from the surrounding area.

A GOOD START IN LIFE 24 kindergartens, a remedial kindergarten and a kindergarten for children with speech defects prepare toddlers step-by-step for their school education to come. 17 primary schools, a special school for speech and hearing difficulties, a special school for learning difficulties, three education centres with "Hauptschulen" and "Realschulen" (secondary schools), a "Gesamtschule" (comprehensive school), two general-education "Gymnasien" (grammar schools) and three vocational "Gymnasien" specialising in business, technology and health and social welfare lay the foundations for subsequent vocational training or university study.

LEARNING FOR A CAREER Three vocational schools in Lingen qualify young people for various careers with dual courses of study.

The Fachschule für Sozial- und Heilpädagogik

trains educators. The Christophorus-Werk is geared to the special requirements for training citizens with disabilities. It enables young people with learning difficulties or other disabilities to gain a vocational qualification and find suitable adult employment.

PRACTICAL STUDY Osnabrück University of Applied Sciences is exploring new ways of dovetailing theory and practice at its Lingen campus with the "Institut für duale Studiengänge" (Institute for Dual Degree Courses) and the other institutes of the Faculty of Management, Culture and Technology, which are cultivating links with local businesses and involved in continuous exchange between research and businesss.

NEVER STOP LEARNING! As well as the further training institutions for industry

"Bildungswerk des Lingener Handwerks e. V." and "Berufsbildungs- und Technologiezentrum GmbH", other institutions offer further training for adults. These include the Volkshochschule Lingen with integrated training centre for information technologies (b.i.t.), the Katholische Akademie, the Heimvolkshochschule Ludwig-Windthorst-Haus and various other institutions of further education.

makes you smart! The city and university library offers over 145,000 media including non-fiction and technical literature, novels, children's and youth literature, DVDs, CDs, videos and games. This represents a further investment by the City of Lingen in the education of its citizens.
